Changemakers develop a high level of civic responsibility, personal agency, and connection to Tulsa.

PROJECT

Ellen Ochoa Changemakers created a survery for 3rd-5th grade students to find out how the current state of the soccer field impacts soccer during recess. Based on 230 responses, they learned that lack of grass and nets greatly impacted recess, often leading to students chasing the soccer ball or stopping to wipe the dirt from their eyes. The Changemakers are currently fundraising to replace the soccer nets and possibly put grass down.

TOPIC: Operation: Fix Up Abandoned Houses

PROJECT

The Mendez Changemakers practiced listening to themselves and their community by prioritizing topics that were important to both. They settled on Homelessness and Abandoned Houses. To understand root causes, they interviewed people who work with the homeless community and volunteered at Night Light Tulsa to serve the homeless and learn about the challenge of homelessness first hand. Their conclusion was that a main root cause of homelessness is not enough affordable housing. After noticing that there were four abandoned houses on the block next to the school, they decided on a project to encourage property owners to renovate the houses and make them available to rent. To inspire a vision, they created a 3D model of the neighborhood and drew pictures of what the houses could look like if they were renovated. They also sent letters to all the property owners encouraging them to renovate their houses.

There are over 12,000 vacant houses in Tulsa. Many of these could be houses for people experiencing homelessness. Our ask is that if you have a house on your block that's vacant, reach out to the owner to encourage them to fix it up.


