PROJECTS ACROSS THE CITY

Bell Elementary

After researching suicide statistics, the Bell Changemakers realized that men make up the highest percentage of suicides. After trying to figure out why that might be, they realized boys are told not to cry or talk about their feelings. They decided to form Brother 2 Brother: an afterschool program for boys to come together, talk in a safe space, hang out, and learn from men in the community.





Hoover Elementary

During the Listen, Listen, Act interview process, Hoover Changemakers learned that not many young people understand the voting process. Their community really wanted to find a way to teach the voting process to kids of all ages. They decided that the best way to do that was to create a coloring and activity book that teaches the process from registration to voting.

Sequoyah Elementary

After much listening, Sequoyah Changemakers saw the need to improve school culture, specifically the lack of interaction between grade levels. They created a Reading Buddies program! Upper elementary students are paired with lower elementary student classrooms for regular reading buddy sessions to promote grade-level connections, enhance communication, and create a supportive learning environment.





Disney Elementary

The Disney Changemakers knew that they needed to start working towards making walks and drives to school a little safer. They listened the community to get closer to a solution to help solve traffic concerns. They have a meeting scheduled with a City of Tulsa representative, and they are hopeful to have more answers, or even speed bumps added, by the end of the 2024-2025 school year.

PROJECTS ACROSS THE CITY

Union 6th Grade

The Union 6th Grade Changemakers realized they must enlighten people about racism. Combating racisim is essential for building a just, equitable, and peaceful world. This process is through education of what racism is, how it is spread, and how it destroys dignity, weakens social cohesion, instills anger and fosters mistrust.





Central Middle School

The Central Changemakers came up with the idea Recess for Middle School. A lack of recess was tied to student misbehavior and acting out. The post-surveys and focus group afterwards revealed that recess at school resulted in less student referrals, less bullying in classrooms, and smoother transition periods.

Will Rogers Middle School

Will Rogers Changemakers focused on animal welfare after noticing how many strays had been seen in the surrounding neighborhoods. After reaching out to several local organizations and surveying the rest of the middle school on their experience, they decided to hold a pet drive as their culminating activity. The Changemakers wanted to get ALL the students involved in making the community a little bit better!





KIPP High School

"Elevate KIPP: Building Confidence, Community, and Character."
This project aims to enhance student etiquette and morale at KIPP
High School by providing practical workshops, recognition
programs, and engaging events that foster professionalism, respect,
and community pride.

LISTEN, LISTEN, ACT METRICS SURVEY RESPONSES

Youth Experience & Social Emotional Learning

- 99% Changemakers report they like coming to Tulsa Changemakers.
- 100% report they have fun at Tulsa Changemakers.
- 98% learn new things at Tulsa Changemakers.
- 90% feel challenged in a good way at Tulsa Changemakers.
- 94% report Tulsa Changemakers helped them feel good about themselves.
- 89% Tulsa Changemakers helped them make new connections with youth and adults.
- 94% would recommend Tulsa Changemakers to a friend.
- 100% parents/guardians surveyed agree Tulsa Changemakers helped their Changemaker feel more confident in their ability to lead and influence change in their school and/or community
- 100% parents/guardians surveyed would recommend Tulsa Changemakers to a friend.

Leadership Mindsets

- 98% believe it's important to listen before taking action.
- 99% believe that when working to improve your community, it's important to set goals and metrics, and evaluate if you were successful afterwards.

Leadership Identity & Confidence

- 93% Changemakers report Tulsa Changemakers helped them see themselves as a leader in their school and/or community.
- 96% report Tulsa Changemakers helped them feel more confident in their ability to lead and influence change in their school and/or community.
- 92% Tulsa Changemakers helped them recognize that their voice matters.
- 87% are more committed to impacting their community than they were before.
- 97% are proud of the work they did with Tulsa Changemakers.

Skills

- 95% Changemakers report Tulsa Changemakers has helped them to improve their leadership skills.
- 97% Tulsa Changemakers helped them to improve their teamwork skills.
- 92% parents/guardians agree that Tulsa Changemakers had a positive impact on their student's school performance.
- 96% parents/guardians agree that Tulsa Changemakers had a positive impact on their student's social skills.

LISTEN, LISTEN, ACT METRICS CHILDREN'S HOPE SCALE

The Children's Hope Scale, published in 1997 by Rick Snyder, can be used to help measure hope in children. Research has linked hope with overall physical, psychological, and social well-being. Children who can identify a means to carry out goals (pathways) and the ability to initiate and sustain action towards goals (agency) are considered more hopeful.

Key 1 – Scores:

- All of the time = 6
- Most of the time = 5
- A lot of the time = 4
- Some of the time = 3
- A little of the time = 2
- None of the time = 1

Key 2 – Assessing Total Scores:

- 6-12 = Very low hope
- •13-18 = Slightly hopeful
- •19-24 = Moderately hopeful
- 25-30 = Highly hopeful
- 30-36 = Very high hope

Fall 2024 Changemakers took a retrospective survey that asked them to answer how they felt before and after participating in Listen, Listen, Act. The below scores are the average for all Changemakers who took the survey.

POWER OF YOUTH

Power of Youth is our crash course in civic advocacy where 6th –12th grade students learn skills to help make change in Tulsa and, broadly, in Oklahoma. This program supports students in understanding how they can advocate for themselves at the local level through collaboration, applying pressure, and creating.

Fall 2024 Power of Youth

- 21 students across 10 schools in the Tulsa metro area participated in POY.
- Of the students who completed our end of program survey:
 - 100% of students enjoyed the program
 - 80% of students said facilitation was helpful and effective
 - 90% of students said they learned things that can help make positive change in the future.
- When asked "What was the most important thing you learned during the program?" students and parents/guardians said:
 - "Learning how to discuss with my peers"
 - "How to fight for change"
 - "As a parent, I appreciate how the sessions were presented in a way for children to understand long term impacts of some of the decisions made in the present."



YOUTH-LED PHILANTHROPY

HALE PHILANTHROPISTS

In partnership with the Zarrow Commemoration Fund, the Hale High School student council comprised of 18 students will go through a philanthropic process to determine how to spend \$10,000 to impact their community. Students have completed a listening campaign to hear from their community about what they care about. Through that listening, the group has determined 3 focus areas they want to direct the funds towards.



Each project is focused on school culture and morale.

- 1. Murals: To boost school pride and morale, the group will seek student generated ideas and partner with the AP art class to create a mural in the secured entryway.
- 2. Teacher Supply Space: To support teachers and student learning, they will gather feedback on supplies needed to replenish the supply space that last year's group created.
- 3. Fun Day: To increase school spirit and foster positive student and teacher relationships and building on the lessons learned from last year, the group will present a proposal for Fun Day to their school administration.



MONROE PHILANTHROPISTS

In partnership with the Ed Darby Foundation, we launched our fourth cohort of Monroe Philanthropists, a youth-led philanthropy program at Monroe Demonstration Academy where a team of 12 8th grade students are designing and executing a philanthropic process with \$10,000.

So far, the Monroe Philanthropists have identified three priority areas and three different projects they are interested in executing next semester. Data for this program will be available in Summer 2025 after projects are completed!









LOOKING FORWARD

CITY OF TULSA YOUTH COUNCIL

Students from across the city will work alongside City Councilors, city employees, and youth to listen, research and act! This opportunity is for 9th-12th graders who live in the City of Tulsa. As a City of Tulsa Youth Council Member, students will have the opportunity to build community with youth leaders from around the city, learn about functions of city government, advise decision-makers on issues directly impacting youth, and conduct a community listening campaign. This will be our 3rd year of the program!



TULSA PUBLIC SCHOOLS YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

The TPS Youth Advisory Council is comprised of students representing 7 high schools across Tulsa Public Schools. Students will convene 4 times throughout the school year to connect with district and school leaders to learn, advocate, and take action on school concerns During their retreat, students were eager to connect with one another and shared their experiences with district personnel. Students will create proposals to present to their school sites and district leaders on issues related to their









CHANGEMAKERS LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

The Changemakers Leadership Council is an intergenerational team of alumni, parents/guardians, and community leaders responsible for providing strategic direction to the Tulsa Changemakers organization, supporting alumni programs, and helping with other functions of the organization. Our Council will be guiding the direction of youth programs in three categories: social, learning, and doing.
