PROJECT DESCRIPTION

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

After spending the fall implementing a school-wide Penny War campaign we were able to raise roughly \$650 for the garden. We were also awarded a \$1000 grant from Oklahoma Department for Environmental Quality. We spent the early part of this semester reaching out for more donations. We received a donation of 50+ feed buckets that will be recycled as raised garden beds from Cabin Creek Farms in Cushing, Oklahoma. We also met with the owner of Tulsa Topsoil and received a generous donation of 6 cubic yards of garden mix enriched soil.

Literacy for All

PROJECT

A New to You Book Project

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

After listening to ourselves and conducting one-on-one interviews we were able to identify providing literacy opportunities for all as our topic for this project. Speaking with students and staff members around the school we quickly became aware of a need to make sure the students were engaged in meaningful literacy opportunities away from the school environment. We determined that many students do not have access to books at their home. We sent out surveys to all teachers, the staff, and every student from 3rd - 5th grade regarding the concerns around literacy and access to books at home. Our data showed an overwhelming amount of students who do not have an at-home library or showed that they had fewer than 10 books available at their home.

After receiving this data set, we spoke with our school librarian and came up with ideas on how to provide books to students. We set out to create a book sale fundraiser. A book drive was created to gather up new and used books that were donated by our staff, students, and families. We look forward to having our Book Fair at the end of May and look forward to seeing how we can provide students with many new books for their homes.

PROJECT

Needs Drive for the Homeless & New Lunchroom Seating

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- For the month of May, we proposed that all 3rd & 4th graders could select where they sit at lunch. We presented our idea to Mr. Glaze & Mrs. Bradshaw.
 Students go to lunch as normal, but for the first week, students could choose where to sit at that classroom table. Following a successful week, students would then be able to choose to sit anywhere in the 3rd & 4th grade section.
- We learned that some of our own students at JEE experienced homelessness. We also learned that most everyone wants to help their unhoused neighbors, but not everyone knows the best way to help them. So, we wanted to create summer care packages for the homeless community. We held a needs drive to collect the items needed for the care packages. Our school collected the items over a week. We shared this information with our own school, our school district, and our community through Social Media, Newsletters, and Flyers.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

What a semester for our Tulsa Virtual Academy Changemakers team! Our small group overcame a variety of barriers to be the inaugural TVA Elementary Changemakers group, including a late start and a bout of Covid for the team coach! Despite these setbacks, our team was able to go through the Listen, Listen, Act process to settle on a focus on the environment, and specifically on littering and pollution in our community. After sending out a school-wide survey to gauge awareness and knowledge of issues related to littering and pollution - a survey that saw 80 responses! Our team decided to carry out an education campaign in our school to inform their fellow students about the impact of littering and pollution on our city, and how they can form good habits in their own lives towards our environment.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

After listening to ourselves and conducting one-on-on interviews with our principals and dean, we identified mental health as our topic. We conducted a survey in which we received 70 responses from our students and noticed that over a third of the respondents said they struggled with mental health. Many felt isolated in their homes, but said that they felt better when we moved to a more hybrid virtual school model. We want to host a mental wellness event in May, Mental Health Awareness Month.
