Elementary, middle, and high school Changemakers go through a youth leadership development and action program that supports them in making meaningful change in their schools and communities. During this program, Changemakers leveraged their unique perspectives and conducted listening campaigns to identify community strengths and challenges, committed to well - researched solutions, and worked collaboratively to drive real and measurable change.

## **Listen to Self & Others**

Changemakers begin the semester listening to themselves to name challenges and opportunities they see in their communities. Then they listen to the community through one-on-one interviews and surveys. It is this listening that supports students in determining what topics and projects were a priority to their community.






# FROM LISTENING TO ACTION

### MAKING CONNECTIONS AND BUILDING SKILLS

Tulsa Changemakers measures how students grow their leadership, social emotional, and professional skills through the listen, listen, act program.

#### **Youth Experience and Social Emotional Learning**

- 95% Changemakers report they like coming to Tulsa Changemakers.
- 100% report they have fun at Tulsa Changemakers.
- 95% learn new things at Tulsa Changemakers.
- 92% feel challenged in a good way at Tulsa Changemakers.
- 94% report Tulsa Changemakers helped them feel good about themselves.
- 87% Tulsa Changemakers helped them make new connections with youth and adults.
- 92% would recommend Tulsa Changemakers to a friend.



#### Leadership Identity & Confidence

- 88% Changemakers report Tulsa
   Changemakers helped them see themselves as a leader in their school and/or community.
- 93% report Tulsa Changemakers helped them feel more confident in their ability to lead and influence change in their school and/or community.
- 92% Tulsa Changemakers helped them recognize that their voice matters.
- 90% are more committed to impacting their community than they were before.
- 98% are proud of the work they did with Tulsa Changemakers.

#### Skills

- 98% of Changemakers believe it is important to listen before taking action
- 99% of Changemakers believe that when working in the community, it's important to set goals and evaluate if you were successful afterwards
- 93% Changemakers report Tulsa Changemakers has helped them to improve their leadership skills.
- 93% Tulsa Changemakers helped them to improve their teamwork skills.

### LISTEN, LISTEN, ACT METRICS CHILDREN'S HOPE SCALE

The Children's Hope Scale, published in 1997 by Rick Snyder, can be used to help measure hope in children. Research has linked hope with overall physical, psychological, and social well-being. Children who can identify a means to carry out goals (pathways) and the ability to initiate and sustain action towards goals (agency) are considered more hopeful.

#### Key 1 – Scores:

- All of the time = 6
- Most of the time = 5
- A lot of the time = 4
- Some of the time = 3
- A little of the time = 2
- None of the time = 1

#### Key 2 – Assessing Total Scores:

- 6-12 = Very low hope
- •13-18 = Slightly hopeful
- •19-24 = Moderately hopeful
- 25-30 = Highly hopeful
- 30-36 = Very high hope

Every semester Changemakers take a retrospective survey that asked them to answer how they felt before and after participating in the afterschool program. The below scores are the average for all Changemakers who took the survey.

# **POWER OF**<br/>YOUTHYouth voice, choice, and<br/>power in the civic sphere

Through the Power of Youth program, young people learn skills to create change through civic advocacy and action. During sessions, youth learn how to collaborate, apply pressure, and create for change.

# Survey Data

- 92% enjoyed the Changemakers Power of Youth Program.
- 92% said the facilitation (the teaching) was helpful and effective.
- 92% felt the sessions were productive.
- 83% felt the sessions helped me learn new skills.
- 75% built a new connection with another person during the Power of Youth sessions.
- 83% learned things during the Changemakers Power of Youth Program that can help me make positive change in the future.
- 83% are more committed to make positive community change/civic change in the future.

On average, spring POY participants who took the survey reported being "moderately hopeful" before the program and "highly hopeful" after the program with a change of +4.3.

# YOUTH-LEDYouth voice, choice, andPHILANTHROPYpower in philanthropy

In partnership with the Ed Darby Foundation at Monroe Demonstration Academy and The Zarrow Commeration Fund at Hale High School, students had \$10,000 to allocate towards an initiative or project to make an impact in their community.

### **Monroe Philanthropists**

In its fourth year, Monroe Philanthropists consisted of fifteen 8th graders who identified healthy eating as their focus. They partnered with Food on the Move to provide a fresh fruit option for every student at lunch. This promoted healthier choices and increased access to nutritious food at school.













## Hale Philanthropists

Hale Philanthropists entered its second year with 20 students representing all grade levels. They identified student and teacher morale and attendance as priorities and took action in three ways:

- 1. Community Building Building on last year's feedback, they planned and led two end-of-year activity days, including the school's first student-led pep rally. These fun days fostered connection and school spirit!
- 2. Murals They funded paint for murals that will be co-created by students and the art teacher next school year. These murals will create a welcoming and vibrant space.
- 3. Teacher Supply Space They'll restock the supply space launched by last year's cohort with notebooks, folders, and pencils. This action will support in reducing teacher costs and keeping classrooms equipped with needed supplies.

# Youth voice, choice, and power at the district level

In partnership with Tulsa Public Schools, 20 students representing 7 schools served as members of the TPS Youth Advisory Council during the 2024-25 school year.

















Students convened 4 times throughout the school year. During these sessions, students had the opportunity to connect with district personnel to learn about the functions of the district and to share about their school experience.


## SUMMER CAMP

# Youth voice, choice, and power across the city


This June, Tulsa Changemakers hosted a week-long camp with 20 middle school campers and 10 high school mentors.




During camp, campers identified community challenges and developed solutions. They visited the Tulsa Farm Lab to explore community-centered approaches and City Hall to learn about local government. Throughout the week, they built skills in problemsolving, public speaking, and teamwork, and ended by presenting their ideas for community impact.
